Today's "Wisdom Of The Saints" Author St. Irenaeus (c. 130 - c. 202)

The Church is fortunate that Irenaeus was involved in many of its controversies in the second century. He was a student, well trained no doubt, with great patience in investigating, tremendously protective of apostolic teaching, but prompted more by a desire to win over his opponents than to prove them in error.

As bishop of Lyons he was especially concerned with the Gnostics, who took their name from the Greek word for "knowledge." Claiming access to secret knowledge imparted by Jesus to only a few disciples, their teaching was attracting and confusing many Christians. After thoroughly investigating the various Gnostic sects and their "secret," Irenaeus showed to what logical conclusions their tenets led. These he contrasted with the teaching of the apostles and the text of Holy Scripture, giving us, in five books, a system of theology of great importance to subsequent times. Moreover, his work, widely used and translated into Latin and Armenian, gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics.

The circumstances and details about his death, like those of his birth and early life in Asia Minor, are not at all clear. However in 2022, Pope Francis named Saint Irenaeus a Doctor of the Church.

Reflection

A deep and genuine concern for other people will remind us that the discovery of truth is not to be a victory for some and a defeat for others. Unless all can claim a share in that victory, truth itself will continue to be rejected by the losers, because it will be regarded as inseparable from the voke of defeat. And so, confrontation, controversy and the like might yield to a genuine united search for God's truth and how it can best be served. (franciscanmedia.org)

The Structure of the Mass, Its Elements, and Its Parts The Individual Parts of the Mass

The Introductory Rites

The Kyrie eleison - After the Penitential Act, the Kyrie eleison (Lord Have Mercy) is always begun, unless it has already been part of the Penitential Act. Since it is a chant by which the faithful acclaim the Lord and implore His mercy, it is usually executed by everyone, that is to say, with the people and the choir or cantor taking part in it.

The Gloria in Excelsis - The Gloria in Excelsis (Glory to God in the highest) is a most ancient and venerable hymn by which the Church, gathered in the Holy Spirit, glorifies and entreats God the Father and the Lamb. The text of this hymn may not be replaced by any other. It is intoned by a Priest, a cantor, or the choir. It is sung either by everyone together, or by the people alternately with the choir, or by the choir alone. If not sung, it is to be recited. It is sung or said on Sundays outside Advent and Lent, and also on Solemnities and Feasts.

The Collect - Next the Priest calls upon the people to pray and everyone observes a brief silence so they may call to mind their intentions. Then the Priest announces the prayer usually called the "Collect". By an ancient tradition of the Church, the Collect prayer is usually addressed to the Father, through Christ, in the Holy Spirit. It is concluded with a Trinitarian ending. The people, joining this petition, make the prayer their own by means of the acclimation Amen. At Mass only a single Collect is ever said.
